

### ABC - Arn Boonstra Connections



When I read my last ABC article, it was full of optimism, promise, and hope as we were about to embark on the opening of the Unity Campus in September 2020. We were in the midst of purchasing the Unity Campus school, planning to hire staff and starting the process of enrolling families at the new school. I shared my excitement about offering Christian education to hundreds more children in the greater Hamilton region over the course of time.

Things at the West 5th Campus were going well, with the opening of the newly installed playground, with Christmas program planning in the works and with the end of the first semester just around the corner. There was excitement and optimism, and with good reason. However, suddenly and seemingly overnight, everything was turned upside down.

I really find myself struggling to write this latest InTouch ABC article. Where does one find hope and inspiration in the midst of a worldwide pandemic that has significantly impacted the CCS community? Plans to open the Unity Campus were put on hold until September, 2021, our educational platform shifted from at school learning to at home learning, many CCS staff and parents were laid off from their jobs, as well as many other serious ways in which our community was disrupted. These concerns do not even address the world wide concerns that are perhaps even more worrisome. The loss of life and the catastrophic economic impact of COVID-19 are staggering. Where does one one find hope and optimism?

I find myself reading certain scripture passages more closely and listening to the words of my pastor more intently these days. Both provide some direction, hope and inspiration when much seems lost. Lamentations 3, in particular, is a source of inspiration for me. The chapter outlines a number of very difficult calamities brought upon humanity. In the midst of those hardships, one can always find God. Read the whole passage, but pay extra attention to verses 22 and 23, where it says, "Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." It is reassuring to know that God's love and faithfulness are so great, that his compassion for us will always be evident, although it is certainly a matter of looking for it at times.

In my search for God's compassion and for hope in times of difficulty, I find church as meaningful as ever, a real credit to our pastor and his team, who have helped us make sense out of troubling times. I find hope offered from parents who are struggling to pay bills or are working on the front lines of health care. I find hope from a board of directors that is measured and keeping one's eyes open to those signs.

So let me elaborate on some of those signs. First, the Bible never promised an easy life; however, it does provide clues as to how to navigate challenges and difficulties. My church leadership team has been inspirational in helping us make some sense of why things happen the way they do. Scripture itself gives me hope in knowing that although times are challenging, God has a carefully worked out plan that has Jesus as the centre of hope. We are reminded in Isaiah 55:8-9 how God's plans may differ from ours.

"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the Lord.

As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts."

Although we may not know what God has in store for us, he nevertheless provides us with hope and direction. Jeremiah 29:11 says, "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." In the midst of so much death and sad news, we are assured that Christ has victory over death and will provide a future that is free of sickness and sin.

Within our own neighbourhoods I see encouraging messages of hope on sidewalks (in chalk), in storefront windows and elsewhere. A constant refrain is that we are all in this together, and that has never been more evident, in that this present health crisis knows no boundaries, politics, gender, or economic status.

We are in this together even when we are apart, and the best way forward is to rely on God's strength and on each other.

The CCS staff has also been inspirational in the way it has rallied together to, in a matter of days, develop an online learning platform that we have called Learning From Home. Teachers have risen to the challenge of pivoting from a method of teaching that has been around for decades to a method of learning that can be accessed from home by parents and their children. Teachers are working with each other, with students, and with parents like never before. Yes, there are problems and challenges, but I also see incredible understanding and grace being exhibited during very trying circumstances.

Some of our CCS families have experienced significant financial losses, including the loss of a job. Paying the monthly food bill is a challenge, never mind trying to pay tuition. Yet other CCS families in a better financial position are donating to the CCS tuition assistance fund in order to support those struggling to pay tuition. Coming together to support others in times of need is a sure sign of hope.

If you read the school's vision and mission statements (on page 2), you can see

much as they are able, parents are guiding the lesson activities that are sent to them by the teacher on a daily basis. The only thing missing from the mission statement in our current circumstances is the classroom. However, significant attempts are being made to foster community in each class, as teachers have set up video conferencing opportunities to meet with students regularly. It has been a privilege to witness how students, parents, and teachers are working together to do the best they can to ensure that learning still takes place at CCS, even in the midst of a pandemic.

Finally, and maybe most importantly, I find hope in our students. They diligently complete lessons emailed to their home. They follow instructions sent by their teachers and explained by their parents. They produce amazing work and share inspirational messages of hope that often only the young can provide. I have students who leave these inspiration messages in chalk on the sidewalk in front of my house! Other children send out messages of love and care to their grandparents on Grandparents Day (you can find examples in this edition of the InTouch). Our young people are growing in knowl-

shining in their talents, their kindness, and their commitment to God. In times of crisis, it is a blessing to know

that we can rely on one another. We have support systems in place, we have people that we can turn to. We are blessed by the comforting words found in scripture and by God's own handiwork in the beauty all around us. May we continue to look for opportunities to support one another and may we always be thankful for a God who loves us and provides.

### Expectations and Hope

Beginning something new always includes expectations and hope. I joined the Calvin Christian School Board of Directors and attended my first meeting in June, 2019. I expected the "typical" logistics of meetings, planning, strategic discussions and emails. I was hopeful that I would have opportunities to use my gifts and talents to further the good work that was already being done at CCS. I was looking forward to meeting and working alongside people who shared the vision of unifying and strengthening our school community.

Along with the work being done at the West 5th site, it was so exciting to jump into the conversations of expanding to add a second campus on Unity Road. These plans follow years of prayer, hope and dreams for growing Christian Education in the Hamilton area. The Compass Committee was tasked with exploring expansion options, and their incredible efforts laid the groundwork for the acquisition of the Unity Road property, with a building suitable for starting up. As a Board, we gathered for additional meetings and a visioning retreat to dream about what the new campus could be. We focused on providing a school that was distinctly Calvin Christian School, while also offering a new vision for the curriculum and learning programs. An extensive market survey was conducted, which helped the Board and staff create a plan for what could be offered. The Open House on January 30 hosted a large gathering in the new space, providing opportunity for discussion and tours. Plans were well underway to offer classes for Junior Kindergarten up to grade 3 for a September 2020 opening, and to move the grades up as the students progressed. We developed a scope-of-work schedule which outlined actions that needed to be completed prior to a fall occupancy. These included renovations to create a safe learning space. Resumes started to come in, and staffing was beginning to come together. There was excitement and hope in the air as the momentum was growing. God was working His hand into these plans, and

we were so hopeful for what the future would bring.

We had another Board meeting on March 3rd, and it was my turn to lead our devotions. Considering we were in the season of Lent, and with March Break around the corner, I chose to focus on the verse "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10). Busy lives need rest. Rest from work, school, meetings, and routines. We sometimes need a reminder to be still, and to align ourselves with the one in whom we find our true rest.

And then, less than two weeks later, the world was told to stand still.

We did not expect this. We were expecting the rest that was to come with March Break, holidays and time spent with family and friends. The Board did not expect to shift quickly into making decisions around what it looks like to close our school. Teachers and administrative staff found themselves reinventing their workday. Parents did not expect to be working from home, or not having work to return to. Families did not expect to have time with loved ones affected by new physical distancing and self isolation measures that had been put into place. Children did not expect to have to stay home unable to return to the school, staff and classmates they hold so dear. Our Board quickly became focused on the well-being of our CCS society: supporting families and our community, examining financial implications, looking at the future of CCS, and the responsibility we had to our staff. We wanted to put our full support behind responding to the needs of the West 5th campus during this unprecedented time.

The COVID-19 pandemic was not part of our Unity Road Board retreat, the Unity Road Open House or our scope-of-work schedule. The closure of job sites and the slowing down of the construction industry was affecting the required school building renovations. Our market survey results seemed so distant in this new economic landscape. The difficult decision was made to postpone the opening of our Unity Road campus. This is not what we expected. Our hope for this site was being shaken, and the momentum and interest that was growing could slow down.

### "BE STILL AND KNOW THAT I AM GOD"

Our current school year has been disrupted. Our children have now experienced a few months of our Learning From Home Program that is being provided by our CCS teachers. New skills are being developed as we all navigate our way through this. In it all, our teachers and staff have come alongside families to support and encourage. Each family situation looks different and the staff have committed to providing hope, care, love and support to their students. Our Vision Statement at Calvin is that each child is 'thoroughly equipped for every good work" (2 Tim 3:17) and, despite the current situation, this continues to be our focus. Woven through our education remains the student goals to Know God, Know Self, Mature, Commit, Be Competent and Serve. Learning looks much different than we expected, however our hope in this vision for our children is unchanging.

Proverbs 3: 5 "Trust in the Lord with all of your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to Him, and He will make your paths straight". It will take a long time to understand the implications this pandemic will have on the world, but we have to trust. Trust that God is in control. Trust that God loves and cares for each one of us. Trust that God will take our plans, and carefully continue to hold them in His hands. In this trust we have hope for the future. The Unity Road campus will look very different this September than we expected, however, our hope for this expansion is unchanging. Taking one step at a time, we will continue to move forward and look ahead to a September 2021 opening. The excitement is still there, and the momentum will grow as we continue to trust.

At my first CCS Board meeting we gathered around the long wooden table in the school's staff room. Now we gather in our homes at our computers around a virtual table. Beginning something new may not always turn out as we had expected. Psalm 46 shows that in our stillness we will know God. I pray that during this time of stillness, we are reminded of who God is, where we find our rest, and in whom we put our trust. This gives us so much hope for the future.

### **MAGIC SOUP**



they become nice.





The Edvance team is committed to supporting affiliate schools in three areas of continuity: business, learning, and leadership.


**BUSINESS CONTINUITY.** In practical terms, this has meant providing regular email bulletin updates and Zoom events that offered timely information on government programs, employment issues, governance concerns, and other pressing issues. Featured guests such as lawyers and accountants addressed questions about government programs at both the federal and provincial level. A favourite past conference keynote presenter, Jim McKenzie, gave advice about recruiting new families for next year, while ensuring current families continued engagement in their school community.

LEARNING CONTINUITY. Discussions have happened both online and via Zoom to help school leaders evaluate learning platforms, ensure student engagement and inclusion, and plan for student assessment (thank you Dr. Phil Teeuwsen for providing your expertise!). Teachers have gathered online—many building new professional friendships—to collaborate and share their lesson plans for learning-from-home.



LEADERSHIP CONTINUITY. Edvance featured counsellors from Shalem Mental Health Network to talk about leader mental wellbeing, and how leaders can support their staff through this time of increased stress. In addition, Calvin's principal, Mr. Boonstra, frequently joins school leaders at regional leadership cohorts established by Edvance for support and fellowship.

Throughout the past few months, it has been abundantly clear that schools are not alone—that Calvin is not alone—in this task of Christian education. There is a strong network here! Most importantly, the whole community has been able to remind each other regularly that God is with all of us through this storm: "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble." 

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### School Counselling Corner



Calvin Christian School, with the support of the Board of Directors, understood the importance of mental health and created the position of school counsellor for 2019/20 school year. This year has been about learning and developing the position in order to meet the social and emotional needs of the students, staff, families, and the greater CCS community.

### THE SCHOOL COUNSELLING ROLE

The goal for the school counselling role is not intended to provide long term support or "therapy" for individual students but to improve mental health and wellbeing for all students, however some one-on-one support may be needed. This support is done in three ways: through teaching schoolwide social/emotional curriculum in classrooms, through small groups, or through short term individual coaching for specific skills and strategies. Here are some of the things that I have been doing this past year:

- Defining and developing what the role of a school counsellor is, based on standards from School Mental Health Ontario (SMHO), and the American School Counselling Association (ASCA)
- Assisting teachers, students, and parents with strategies for managing behavioural, emotional, and social challenges
- Presenting a school wide initiative for learning about emotional regulation called "The Zones of Regulation," a model developed by Leah Kuypers and Social Thinking Inc.. Many teachers have expanded on this model in their individual classrooms
- Continuing with the previously established Grade 6 Social and Emotional Health Unit, held during January and February
- · Liaising with community professionals
- Gathering, consolidating, and sharing resources



### THE IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON MENTAL HEALTH

Since COVID-19 and school closure, there have been many changes in all of our lives. Some of us may have gotten busier, while others have slowed down significantly. Many of us have learned to adapt in new ways but there may still be a range of emotions daily. Some of the common ways that our mental health has been impacted is by having an increase in:

- Fear and worry
- Guilt, comparisons, and feelings of failure
- · Stress and anxiety
- · Depression and apathy
- Loneliness, sadness, grief
- Fatigue
- Overworking
- · Changes in sleep or eating patterns
- · Worsened chronic health conditions
- Increased use of alcohol, tobacco, other drugs

### TIPS TO SUPPORT MENTAL HEALTH DURING COVID-19:

Due to the potential increase of some of the above symptoms, it is helpful to take care of basic needs and to find time for self-care (physical, emotional, spiritual, social). During this time, it may be challenging to do but it is good to remember that we can't pour from an empty cup.

- · Get enough sleep
- · Eat healthy
- Exercise/be active
- Limit screen time
- · Take breaks and do things you enjoy
- Have a schedule/routine/structure to your day

- · Connect with others in new ways
- Stay informed but limit time listening to news and social media
- Find humour and fun when you can
- Take a step back when experiencing heightened emotions.
- Be real and honest with your struggles. It is ok to not have it all figured out or to feel happy all the time
- Be gracious with yourself and others
- Give yourself permission to keep things simple
- Communicate your needs with your spouse/partner/other support people
- Keep low and reasonable expectations of yourself and others
- Take it one day at a time and continue to give it over to God

### UNDERSTANDING LOSS AND STAYING CONNECTED

We have all experienced losses during this pandemic, including the immediate loss of our connection to others, jobs, stability, structure, security, freedoms (to enjoy restaurants, parks, the great outdoors), sense of the future, and a sense of control. We have been unable to participate in the typical rituals, such as funerals, weddings, and graduation ceremonies. These rituals bring closure and are important for moving from one stage to the next.

During this time, it is still important to attend to these losses and learn how to grieve and cope in new ways that will allow

us to move forward and honour memories or moments. It has been amazing to see all of the creative ways that people have learned to cope and connect:

- Virtual dance/art/music lessons or classes, social meetings, game nights, driveway visits
- Caring and encouraging messages or gestures (on sidewalks, windows, letters, phone calls, social media)
- Planting a tree, gardening, dropping off flowers/gifts/meals
- Listening to or creating music/art/funny videos (individually or virtually with a group)

it may be a slow process with many changes. There are still many unknowns at this point in time but we can put our faith in God's guidance and direction. 


### I Read Canadian

### **Wonderfully Made**

You may find yourself looking for new ways to move as we have been asked to stay home to help slow the spread of the COVID-19 virus. Running is a great way to elevate your heart rate, manage stress levels and spend some time outdoors. Maybe you've heard that runners are prone to injuries and while there can be a higher incidence injuries in runners, most of them can be easily avoided with a few key tips.

- 1. BE GRADUAL. One of the number one reasons runners become injured is because they do too much too soon. Ever try going to the gym to shed a few pounds and you don't notice any changes for weeks? That's because God created our bodies to adapt slowly. Take it slow and steady. Your tendons and joints will be less likely to feel overloaded and irritated. General rule of thumb is to not increase any set parameters by more than 10% per week, be it distance or intensity.
- 2. ADD VARIETY. Vary your running surfaces. Running on hard pavement for kilometers at a time can be very repetitive for your joints and tendons leading to injury. Running on trails, adding hills or intervals are great ways to make running less repetitive. Cross training is also beneficial for your body, allowing you to improve strength and stability. Get on a bike or pick up some weights.

### 3. SET A GOAL AND HAVE A PLAN.

What is your goal? Are you running to get in shape, training to race a specific



distance? Knowing your goal will help give you focus and motivation. Goals can be short or long term and they can change over time as well. Write out your plan for running on your calendar. Does it fit in with all the other things going on in your life? If it looks like it is too much, then it probably is.

### 4. SHOW YOURSELF SOME SELF-

LOVE. Take care of yourself. If you run with limited resources you are more likely to overload tissues. Are you regularly getting 7-8 hours of sleep? Are you eating a variety of fruits and veggies and staying away from processed foods? Is your water intake sufficient? Do you have strategies for managing the stress in your life? When you run tired, malnourished/dehydrated or stressed your body is not able to handle the physical demands as well, that is your body. Take care of yourself.

### 5. GET A RUNNING ASSESSMENT.

God created each of us individually so what may work well for one person may not work for another. Bodies, running styles and goals are different. See a physiotherapist or a running expert who can identify biomechanical or gait inefficiencies and provide you with an individualized plan that addresses you specifically and enables you to stay healthy and injury free.




