t is not uncommon for me to hear that parents are looking to enroll their child at Calvin Christian School because they know their child will be placed in a Christian school environment where the child will be safe. Parents are looking for a school that has a good reputation and provides "excellent" academics. The hope is that through such a school environment, the child

will be cared for and taught what is necessary to succeed later in life. I would like to think that CCS takes care of all the above for parents and that we can ensure that their child will indeed experience much success. Perhaps this also explains why CCS is operating at capacity in terms of student enrollment.

The truth is, however, that we live in a world that presents all sorts of difficult challenges, and that is no different within the school setting for children. Children argue, fight, gossip, cheat, steal, lie, watch inappropriate programs, listen to harmful music and so much more. We know these behaviours are a result of a broken and sinful world, and, although we have incorporated a number of amazing programs, such as Restorative Practices, Project Based Learning, and Responsive Classroom, we still can not shield them from the realities of life, nor can we guarantee that all children will be safe and experience success later in life. Even with the wonderful programs mentioned above, I'm more proud of our vision statement, "All God's children are 'thoroughly equipped for every good work.'" (2 Timothy 3:17), because it sums up what we are really trying to accomplish here at CCS. We are striving to equip our students to shine!

Our ultimate purpose is to equip our students to honour God in the way that they live their lives. Our focus in educating is not just to ensure safety and basic skill training or to place them in a moral bubble. It is so much more. Students are equipped to seek God's wisdom as they ride the bus, interact on the playground, learn in the classroom, compete on the soccer field, act on the stage, and engage life in so many other ways. They are instructed on the importance of discernment when faced with tough decisions. Students are encouraged to seek justice in a fallen and broken world. Students are given tools to help them interact with one another in ways that honour the other. They are constantly reminded that glorifying God is their rightful act of worship as Christians. Together, we strive to model our lives after Jesus.

While attending the Christian School Canada Leadership Conference back in September, I signed up for a workshop entitled "Faithful Justice and a Reconciling Presence." The description of the workshop really resonated with me and reminded me of the opportunity we have to focus on being agents of change. "Through an engagement with biblical stories of hope, we will explore how listening to the cries

of the broken creates in us a deep hunger for justice and reconciliation, one that enables us to be a faithful and reconciling presence in our communities and world." When our math, science, or history classes focus on a hunger for justice and bringing reconciliation to our communities, then we are heeding the call of Jesus to love our neighbour.

At the Edvance teachers' convention in October, one of the keynote speakers delivered a message that emphasized the importance of student formation, where the learning that takes place creates "outposts of goodness and beauty." Although the process can be costly and painful, ultimately, if we are doing education with hope, students can be transformed to help build a world of goodness and beauty. In that hope, it is our desire to educate with the child, rather than to the child. Teacher and educators walk alongside their students to help them deal with whatever brokenness they might experience. Our Responsive Classroom instruction is specifically geared to supporting students socially and emotionally as they tackle the challenges of school life.

Our staff recently decided that we would institute new guidelines that would be the basis

for living in community here at CCS and, by extension, for equipping to shine. We created three categories: take care of others, take care of yourself, and take care of our space. Following these basic principles can begin to be the guide in how to live our lives, principles that will help us to pursue how to be outposts of goodness and beauty.

It the midst of all these attempts to equip our students to shine, we still fall short, however, we also still have hope. We know that we don't rely upon our own efforts and that it is only through the grace of God that we move forward in this broken and fallen world. It is through the sacrifice of God's son that we have hope. How do we communicate that hope to our world? We strive to to give hope by going out into our communities as outposts, rather than by being content to stay in our own shelters. God has provided us a message of hope to deal with the brokeness, and at Calvin Christian School we are uniquely positioned to work with students in such a way that they themselves can become outposts of goodness and beauty to provide safety and shelter for those seeking love and support. As we seek to carry out our mission, may we experience God's spirit so that all may truly shine. •

AIM French

After almost four years of teaching the French AIM program here at CCS, I find that I'm really enjoying it!

Top 4 things I like about AIM:

It's fun!

From the start of class time until the end, we sing songs, move around, read, and speak together using French. Each grade is learning a dramatic story with amusing characters which make us laugh as we listen to, read, and retell the story. With its emphasis on developing listening and speaking skills, students are actively engaged in hearing and producing French for the whole class time. Each French word is gestured by me, the teacher, so students can actually watch the language unfold, and be prompted by each gesture to speak with confidence and accuracy in French. Aural, visual and kinesthetic learners can easily remember vocabulary, and can actively engage their whole bodies in learning the language.

It's different!

Sometimes, learning the AIM way is so different, it almost seems weird! Weird in a fun way. Gone are the vocabulary lists to memorize. Gone are the formal verb conjugations. Gone are the endless sentences to rewrite. Gone are the lengthy paragraphs to decode. AIM provides meaningful, engaging, authentic communicative activities. As a result, students first listen, then speak, then read, and then write in French (strictly in that order), which is the reverse of how many of us have learned French (but is, in fact, how one learns a first language)! Because the teacher's gestures help the students speak with accuracy (grammatically and with correct pronunciation), they gain confidence in speaking French right away and develop strong fluency skills. From there, the vocabulary embeds in the students' brains, so that when the written word is introduced, it has strong meaning and can be

easily retained. In addition, a big difference from traditional programs is that of verb conjugation. Instead of introducing all forms of regular and irregular verbs, AIM uses conjugations in first person because these conjugations all sound the same. In order to express the plural, AIM uses conjugations for "on" (we) and "tout le monde" (everyone). These controlled verb conjugations allow students to create full sentences, which then increases their ability to effectively communicate complete ideas right from the start. This increases fluency, which increases satisfaction, which increases desire to communicate more - all of which increases teacher, student, and parent happiness!!!

It offers full support.

During class time, the teacher is the main support for the student, guiding the choral French speaking using gestures, and prompting students individually to speak, with gestural support as necessary. Outside of class time, AIM teachers and students all have access to the AIM web portal in which we can view and hear each song, story and play. In addition, each word and gesture that we learn is accessible for review. For parents, the web portal and website offer more information on the AIM philosophy and methodology, and a means to encourage and help their child in learning the vocabulary of his/her specific kit. Parents: if you would like to get your child connected to this AIM web portal in order to review at home, please email me for login information at jvaneek@ccshamilton.ca . In addition to the AIM web portal, I have created a French website of my own! On it, students can find songs, videos, activities, and worksheets to enhance and enrich the AIM material. I use many resources from this site during our lessons. so students should find it familiar and easy to navigate. To learn how to access my site, please visit your child's classroom webpage.



The kids are speaking French! Teachers share with me that they hear their students using French phrases appropriately with their peers during other classroom activities. In the hallways, students are greeting me and each other in French and carrying on short, impromptu interactions using French. Parents tell me that their kids are conversing in French at home, as well as noticing French on signs and packaging. Some kids are even singing the AIM songs at birthday parties together! Their brains are absorbing it, their mouths are producing it with confidence, and their hearts are enjoying it. Qa, c'est fantastique!

I'm pretty sure that primary and junior CCS students like the AIM French program for the same reasons that I do! So, just ask them: "Est-ce que tu aimes la classe de français? Pourquoi?", and please report back to me!:) •



Walk in the Forest

Visiting the Forest

At the Fall Membership meeting, I teased our Jubilee and Senior Kindergarten teachers about not inviting me to join them in the forest. The forest visit is a regular part of the Outdoor Education program in Jubilee and SK. The program involves a couple of hours of exploring a nearby forest, and I always thought that sounded like a great idea. Well, consider me invited. Mrs. Wiebenga's entire A class hand delivered an invitation that read as follows:



How could I resist such an invitation! As I joined the class first thing in the morning, I got a glimpse of what is all involved in preparing for the trip. It really is quite an ordeal outfitting 45 children for a trip to the forest. A mandatory bathroom visit was the first step. Mittens, hats, zippers, boots, coats, snow pants and more, all had to be dealt with. These are crucial details to ensure a safe and enjoyable trip. Thankfully Mrs. Wiebenga and Mrs. Hagen arranged a crew of parents, and me, to help out.

After everyone was properly outfitted, the children clambered up onto the bus and took their seats. Some students had very little

experience ever being on a bus, so even this was a learning opportunity. I heard the teachers say: "Be-hind on the seat, please" more than once. It really is sort of strange travelling with 4 and 5 years on a bus, mainly because you don't really see them. Sure, you can hear them chattering, but since the seat backs are so high, the students are virtually hidden from view. I simply saw the backs and heads of the adults.

We arrived safely at our destination, the Dundas Conservation Area, behind the Ancaster Lion's Club Pool and exited the bus. Students gathered with group leaders and proceeded to the "praise circle," a large open area located a short distance into the forest. Just keeping up with the students as they made their way to the circle was a bit of a challenge.

Once students had an opportunity to blow off a little steam by running around in the open area, Mrs. Wiebenga brought the entire group to the praise circle to begin the formal part of the trip. She welcomed everyone and led us in a time of prayer. She thanked God for the awesome opportunity to visit his beautiful forest creation. Next, Mrs. Wiebenga reminded students of the very important rules of staying with your group leader (more on that in a moment) and the need to respect God's creation. In other words, students could explore the forest, but should not be breaking branches off trees or destroying the forest in any other ways.

We were not exploring the forest simply for pleasure's sake, but rather with a specific goal of looking for "treasures" in God's creation and, more specifically, for "letters" in the forest as they revealed themselves to us, via branch growth, log patterns or any other ways. Students were challenged to enjoy the explora-tion, as well as to look for letters of the alphabet to reinforce some of the learning that takes place in the classroom. The goals for today were part of the broader goals of the outdoor education program that is offered in Jubilee and Kindergarten. Outdoor education plays an important role in learning, providing children with opportunities to experiment and explore, to ask questions and make observations, to solve problems and build theories, all while enjoying God's wonderful creation. Once the final instructions were delivered,

steep slope. I quickly learned why rule number one, stay with your group leader, was so important. I corralled the boys back together and decided that I had better take charge or who knows what kind of adventures we could find ourselves in! Typically on a forest hike I might find myself meandering along, but not with this group. They were eager and excited to climb the slopes, scramble over and under logs, jump in the mud, and try every other thing typical 5 year old boys might want to do.

I reminded the boys of our goals and for the next hour the forest slowly but surely revealed its treasures to us, as well as the different patterns that provided many letters of the alphabet. Moss, sticks, bark, and branches went into our treasure bag (later to be returned to the forest), and after a while we had spied half of the letters in the alphabet. We peered up at trees that were full of holes carved out by woodpeckers seeking a meal. Standing at creek's edge, we watched the water cascade over rocks and disappear into the over rocks and disappear into the ground. There was no shortage of beauty to admire, and at times the boys were enthralled.

However, hanging out in the chilly forest for over an hour taxes even the most hardy of children. Besides, after lending my gloves to one of the boys, I was pretty well done too! We headed back to the praise circle to join the others. Mrs. Hagen asked each group what they discovered and now many letters they found. Students excitedly shared their information. Appropriately, we closed the praise circle by singing a song based on our theme, "I'm a Child of God," and offered a prayer of gratitude to our Heavenly Father.

Heading back to school, reflected on what a great morning it was. Through the outdoor education program in Jubilee and SK our students lear ned about the amazing forest created by our God. They were

physically active as they carried out their exploration. They poked and prodded stumps, trees, branches, and each other. They carefully navigated mud, creeks, logs, and rocks. Back on the bus, one little fellow fell asleep on my shoulder, and I think it was a fitting end to a wonderful morning Thanks Jubilee and Senior Kindergarten for inviting me on your forest excursion. I can't wait untill the spring trip!

We have begun the 10th year of the After School Care Program. It is a great program that really creates a family like environment as it includes a variety of ages of our school aged children. STEEL BEAMS

Recent visitors to Calvin Christian School may be excused for wondering if our school has instituted an architectural program. There has been a lot of talk in the hallways and classrooms about Steel Beams. The Steel Beams everyone is talking about are not physical structural features, however, but a new leadership program.

Steel Beams is an acronym for Student Teams Excitedly Engaging in Leadership Because Every Action MatterS. This initiative provides students from grades 4 to 8 with an opportunity to practice leadership skills by participating in a wide variety of activities that contribute to school life. Just as we have steel beams all around the building that are integral to the structure, so too the leadership that the students provide is necessary for the smooth functioning of our school body. Some of our actual steel beams are easily visible, while others are hidden away. In the same way, some of our Steel Beams teams will be doing work that is public, while others will be doing their crucial work behind the scenes.

The Steel Beams program is intended to provide students with an opportunity to practice not only leadership skills but also job skills. Students learned about the program in an assembly in late September, and were invited to peruse the "job listings" of the 44 Steel Beams teams. Each listing indicated the desired skills, the age requirements, the time commitment, and the number of positions

available. Students filled out applications for up to four teams, explaining why they wanted to join and what skills they would bring to the team. The Steel Beams Committee sorted the applications and passed them on to team leaders, who selected as many students as they needed. In the end, every student who applied was chosen for at least one team and most teams had enough applicants to fill each position.

The Steel Beams teams provide for a broad range of engagement. There are students who will be planning seasonal spirit events while others are part of the advertising team which will be creating posters and brochures to promote those events. Some students give up part of their recess once a week to help in the Jubilee, SK and Grade 1 classes, either helping the students get ready to go outside, or doing some tasks in the classroom to help the teachers. Students participate in weeding the gardens, tidying the library, tying skates in the winter, and reading the morning announcements over the intercom. Keep an eye on the CCS website, as there is also a group of students who will be sharing student news and producing blog posts on a regular basis.

It is our hope that students and staff alike will benefit from Steel Beams. While students develop their leadership and work skills, they also provide valuable assistance to the staff. Staff members have the opportunity to train, supervise, and get to know a different group

of students. As they serve CCS, students will also develop a greater sense of responsibility for themselves, those around them, and the physical school environment. At the end of the year, we will celebrate the students' contributions during our annual awards assembly. Each student will receive a certificate with stickers representing their Steel Beams and other extra-curricular involvement.

If you are the parent of a CCS student, please ask your child(ren) about their Steel Beams positions. Encourage them to serve with glad hearts and with commitment.

Each one is needed to keep CCS strong. •
