During the first week of May, we traditionally celebrate Christian Education Week with a couple of very special events: Open House and Grandparents Day. Because of all the complications associated with the health crisis, we have been unable to open our school doors to visitors for the past two years. However, this year, we were allowed to once again welcome parents and grandparents into our school buildings, and what a delight that was! As the old saying goes, you don't know what you're missing until you don't have it. In chatting with a number of parents and grandparents, it was clear to me that perhaps we have taken some of these special occasions for granted and perhaps that's the reason it was so special to once again be able to gather in person. I'm not sure I have ever witnessed such excitement and enthusiasm for these events. Students, staff, parents, and grandparents were all eager to gather and to simply be in each other's presence; maybe the pandemic has taught us the importance of valuing each other and not taking for granted the little things in life.

I think the above also speaks to the importance of living in community, which has been very difficult the past couple of years. At Calvin Christian School, we have spent a great deal of time reflecting on the importance of community, and a number of our educational practices reflect that reality. Each day, teachers begin their classes in a time of devotion, and this might be the most important time of community building as students share prayer requests with each other so that they are able to pray for one another's needs. Devotion time is part of the larger program called Responsive Classroom, which I have referenced in the past. Responsive Classroom is an educational philosophy built upon supporting students socially, emotionally, and spiritually, and there has probably never been a more important time than today to provide these supports for our students.

There are many other practices that we employ to foster community, including Restorative Practices and our Buddy Program. I think the above also speaks to the important work of the school's Racial Diversity and Belonging Committee. When attending CCS, we want all students to feel a sense of belonging and care that is modeled after the love of Christ.

Why do we bother with fostering all these social interactions and communal learning? Well, I believe that is the way God wired us and that it is also one of the best ways to reflect the love of God. Caring for each other is central to living a life of service to God, and addresses the greatest commandment God gave to us: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: Love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these" (Mark 12:30-31).

In a society and world where division seems more common than ever, it is important to remember that God has called us to love Him and our fellow human beings, and if we are to model our love after Christ it needs to be unconditional. As the apostle John puts it, "This is how we know what love is: Jesus laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters." (1 John 3:16)

It was wonderful for us to welcome parents back into our midst during Christian Education Week. I could tell that both parents and grandparents were excited to be a part of communal living and the pandemic has really limited our ability to experience community. However, more important is the fact that we try to foster a sense of community daily for our staff and students at Calvin Christian School. May God use all of us to foster belonging and community in a broken and hurting world.



AS THE WEATHER HEATS UP, we're pleased to announce that the BUILDING UNITY Capital Campaign has now officially launched and is heating up just as fast! At the same time, our new campus on Unity Road continues to be a wonderful blessing, allowing us to serve growing enrollment demand. Already, we're seeing a strong pipeline of enrollment for next year, and we've already had to add a second class to our Kindergarten program at the new Unity Campus for Fall 2022, equipping another new generation to shine for Christ.

At our last update, we informed that our Management, Building, and Capital Campaign Committees have been working diligently behind the scenes planning the building project and launching the canvassing teams to connect with initial underwriting donors. While that work will continue through the summer, we're now very excited to officially launch our full campaign to the balance of the community.

Thanks be to God, we've already received a wonderful outpouring of financial support from a growing list of initial underwriting donors who collectively have pledged over 7 figures toward our goal of \$5 million dollars! Now, we're ready to engage the rest of our community to help us get the rest of the way to our goal.

### **Important Questions**

### WHAT WILL BE THE ENROLLMENT CAPACITY OF THE NEW SCHOOL?

Based on feedback from the CCS community in our 2019 Market Study and our 2020 Phase 1 Discovery Research, it is clear that the community wants us to offer a full elementary school program at the Unity Campus (JK to Grade 8 – Full classes) which will translate to a capacity of about 250 students. This added capacity will free up desperately needed capacity at the West 5th Campus, ultimately providing a total capacity of approximately 750 students, which directionally aligns with straight-line demand projections based on population growth in the area. Additional specialty classrooms are part of the vision for the campus which could provide additional future capacity if/when needed.

### WHAT WILL BE THE SIZE OF THE NEW SCHOOL BUILDING?

The Management Committee is working in tandem with the Building Committee and its chosen architect to envision the details for the proposed campus. At this point the plan is to build a directionally similar size to the West 5th Campus. (Approximately 25-35,000 square feet)

#### WHEN WILL THE NEW BUILDING BE READY?

The Management Committee will be managing the construction plan and timeline commensurate with cash inflows from the Capital Campaign. That said, the community has expressed a strong desire to build ASAP, and so we will be looking to expedite the build as soon as possible, with occupancy by 2026 (or sooner). In the meantime, the existing building at Unity will continue to operate to satisfy immediate enrollment demand growth as best possible.

#### WHAT WILL BE THE COST OF THE PROJECT?

As design plans for the building are determined by the Management Committee, the Building Committee will be working with its designated building contractor and vendors to confirm the cost. At this point, the preliminary high-level estimate for the building is approximately \$10-\$15 million.

### WILL A \$5 MILLION CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COVER THE WHOLE PROJECT COST?

NO, and we plan to use long-term mortgage financing to pay for the balance of the project, recognizing that multiple generations will be using the facility, and therefore one single generation shouldn't be required to bear the whole cost.

### IS THERE \$5 MILLION OUT THERE?

YES, our community has demonstrated the capacity to give in aggregate to this level, and now it is time for everyone to lean in as far as possible and financially contribute toward this highly important Kingdom work.

### WILL MY DONATION REALLY MATTER?

YES! We have fully entrusted this project to God, and He is in complete control as we undertake to build this school to fulfill our calling in His kingdom work. Therefore, your donation will be a practical investment in this work, shining light to multiple future generations in the Greater Hamilton Area and ultimately across Canada as our students graduate and migrate abroad. While we pray to continue to receive several large donations to help underwrite the project, the truth is that every single donation is needed. The good news is that over 3000 families have been blessed by the school since 1952, and we are praying for broad support from this faithful community of passionate advocates for Christian Education. With some quick math, If every one of these 3000 families pledged \$500 per year over the next 4 years, our target would be reached and surpassed!

### From the Board

I HAD THE PRIVILEGE this past year of serving as the chair of the Personnel Committee here at Calvin Christian School. As I reflect on the interviews that have recently been conducted to fill vacant teaching roles, I realize I have developed a deeper understanding and a profound pride for the high standard of education that our children receive inside the walls of Calvin on a daily basis. I am more aware of the intention and meaning behind some of the practices that have been adopted and implemented in classrooms at our school, and understand more clearly the heart of our educators to develop more than just knowledge of the world in their students. I would like to share what I have learned from being a part of these interviews in hopes of reminding you of the immeasurable blessing and worthwhile investment Calvin is to its students in preparing and equipping them to actively shine Christ's light in their world, now and in the future.

Responsive classroom is a practice that Calvin has used in classrooms for a number of years. Responsive classroom is a student-centred approach to learning and discipline that looks at the social, emotional and spiritual well-being of each child in the class. Its goal is to create a welcoming and safe place for students to express their feelings and to be a part of their classroom community in a meaningful way. Every day at Calvin starts with a morning meeting where children are given the opportunity to welcome each other by name and are given the time and space to respond to a question presented to the class. In this way a sense of belonging is fostered as each child is seen, heard and given an opportunity to contribute to their classroom community. During this time students share prayer requests and then are able to pray for their classmates and the things big or small going on in their lives. What a blessing for our kids to be able to learn what it means to be in a meaningful community by praying with and for each other.

Students at Calvin are taught how to recognize and regulate their emotions and are provided practical ways to manage their feelings. Teachers strive to understand that there may be more going on behind undesired behaviours and provide space for their students to feel heard, and then work with the student to come to a solution. In this way students learn to manage a variety of emotions and learn to work through difficult situations in positive and Christhonouring ways. These are skills that are invaluable for our students as they grow to be followers of Christ.

I learned how Calvin values differentiated learning, the practice of meeting students where they are at academically and giving students choice in how they feel most confident in presenting material they have learned based on the gifts they have been given. There are opportunities for work to be shown in the form of written essays, poster projects, verbal presentations, and other creative expressions. In allowing children to choose how to share their information, it recognizes that God has created each of us with unique gifts. It is an opportunity to use and develop these strengths, creating confidence in the students.

There is a lot of collaboration that takes place inside and outside the classroom which reinforces the idea that God created his children to be in community, to problem solve when issues arise and to deal with conflict in a way that glorifies and honours God. Our teachers work with their grade partners or crews to come up with creative ideas or share struggles they face in their classrooms. Our students benefit from this teacher-teamwork as input from others enriches ideas. Students collaborate while working on projects. Recently I had the privilege of watching our daughter's class raise \$5000 to donate to World Renew towards the crisis in Ukraine. I saw the excitement in what she shared of how her class came up with this idea, how the class worked together to create videos and posters to create awareness, how they worked feverishly to make bookmarks and count the money they raised. So many aspects of learning were involved in this project where these students were able to take ownership and to shine brightly to our community. These opportunities are given to our students so they can see from a young age that they can be agents of positive change and good in this broken world.

These are just a few examples of what I learned while conducting interviews with the Personnel Committee this spring. I consider it a blessing to have been a part of this process as it has enriched my knowledge and deepened my gratitude of what happens in the classroom and makes me thankful to be a part of the community here at Calvin Christian School.

FOR MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH, our school counselor, Mrs. Schinkel, asked for student wellness volunteers from grades 6-8 to help with various tasks. There was an overwhelming turnout of 32 volunteers!! This large group was split into three different groups with specific tasks:

- 1. Student Wellness Wall/Mural: Students were given the task to update the current bulletin board with the theme of overall wellness and to design ideas for murals and paintings around the school.
- **2. Student Wellness Station:** Students helped to run an outdoor station on Wellness Wednesdays for the month of May. Each class was invited to visit the wellness station to learn mental wellness strategies, and how to express their emotions.
  - Feelings hopscotch promoting talking about feelings
  - Communal Artwork promoting mental health wellness
  - Be Kind to Your Selfie photo booth promoting self confidence
- **3. Student Wellness Team:** Students will be asked to volunteer again in September 2022, male and female representatives from each grade (6-8), to work on monthly wellness themes for the whole student body.







### **How Can We Build Community?**

WE DID NOT EXPECT that what started with a Kindergarten student asking, "Where does Mr. Boonstra work?" would end with students working with EduDeo, raising money for a playground in Belize while singing, "Bring your pockets full of coins, we want to build a playground!"

When a Kindergarten student inquired about where Mr. Boonstra's office was in our school building, this emphasized that it was time for our Kindergarten students to explore our school building and perhaps take a look at our school community more closely. Kindergarten teachers at the West 5th and Unity campuses decided that the timing seemed appropriate to explore the question, "What is Community?" especially in the wake of Covid's isolating practices. In the end, we as teachers were hoping that students would be able to define what community is and look at the purpose of community. We wanted the students to be able to practice being community builders, while realizing that we are all part of God's story.





Kindergarten embarked on this community project by exploring individual family and cultural communities, and by also revisiting the idea that our classroom is a community, it is our classroom family. Together we noticed that community is a place to live, work, learn and have fun together. We noticed that God has created and placed us in a community to help us grow.

Kindergarten students took a closer look at our larger school community by interviewing Very Important People (VIP) from our school community, unashamedly asking questions like, "How old are you?", "Have you lost any teeth?", "Do you live with your mom and your dad?", "What do you do on Saturdays and Sundays?" Students were very interested in the lives of others and recorded the VIP's responses.



Students also spent time exploring our school buildings, looking behind doors that they had never noticed before. They translated the findings of their exploration by plotting their findings on a map of our school building, labeling the map, and adding details that caught their attention, while making connections like, "My brother is in that class!"

Through the exploration of our own students' cultural communities, we realized that there are things that are the same about us all and things that also make us uniquely different. We also began to explore another cultural community as a Belize flag appeared on our world map. We began to explore how our community was the same as a child's in Belize and how it is different by looking at our school building, playground, food, houses, language, etc. We wrote letters and received a letter from the children in Belize



telling us more about their school and also sharing favourite game ideas. After reflecting on our own communities and telling God how thankful we were for these communities, we wondered, "How can we be community builders? How can we dream with God, knowing we are part of His story?" We decided to partner with EduDeo Ministries to raise funds for Emmanuel Preschool's playground in Belize by having a Coin Drive.

The whole student body was on board, and many children enjoyed the PLINKO board set up at West 5th for their donations. Unity Campus put out a bucket challenge, "Can you help fill a bucket?" During Open House and Grandparents' Day, visitors at both campuses were invited to contribute to the Emmanuel Preschool's Playground Coin Drive with a goal of \$1500. We were amazed at the final total, with over \$3000.00 raised! We are happy and thankful to be a small part of God's grand story.

OVER THE YEARS in my career, and especially in my work outside of the school for the last 7 years with child trauma and sexual abuse, I have been learning more about the impact of early childhood trauma and, specifically, the harmful impact of early access to porn on same age peer to peer abuse, on harmful sexual behaviour, and on unhealthy relationships. Unfortunately, pornography is a silent, yet global issue, that needs a loud and global response.

In an effort to empower and protect kids in this digital age, increasing their knowledge around safety online has become essential for their well-being. More and more experts are saying that this knowledge should also include teaching kids about the risks and harm of pornography. This topic is often avoided with children and youth because it can feel uncomfortable and shaming. What has become increasingly evident, however, is that by talking openly and learning together about the harm and risks of online pornography, we can help build resilience and discernment in the digital world. It is hoped that in gaining a deeper understanding and awareness of the negative impact online pornography has on children, we can be motivated to break the silence about this hidden pandemic.

#### **OUICK FACTS:**

- Currently, the average age of first exposure to porn is as young as 11.
- There has been a 25% increase of access to porn sites (various ages) since the beginning of the COVID pandemic.
- 100% of porn now is violent, aggressive, degrading, non-consensual, and abusive towards women, specifically, racialized women.

### WHY TEACH ABOUT THE HARMFUL EFFECTS OF PORNOGRAPHY?

 Unfortunately, we live in a hypersexualized/ pornified culture - our kids are exposed to harmful sex stereotypes in the media, movies, music, and advertising which has become normalized. This can influence kids to inadvertently make physical comparisons and seek to live up to the sexualized portrayal of body types, gender stereotypes, and sex expectations.

- Pornography has become increasingly accessible to very young children and notably difficult to block. Accidental searches, pop ups and links can lead to the viewing of images or videos that portray violent and degrading messages about sex and gender. Everything is just a click away and this is harmful to a child's developing brain.
- Pornography portrays a deeply problematic and violent view of sex, causing a normalization of violence in relationships for those exposed.
- Pornography impacts a child and youth's social emotional well-being and their understanding of healthy relationships in dramatically negative ways.
- Excessive use of porn can lead to abusive and addictive behaviours. There is increasing evidence of peer on peer abuse (acting out what they are seeing), problematic sexual behaviours, and pornography addiction, due to the ease of access to online pornography.
- Research has shown that the exposure to porn increases risk of: mental health challenges (depression, anxiety), increased body dissatisfaction, eating disorders, body image issues, isolation, shame, addiction, desensitization to violence in sex, sexting, creation of self-produced sexual images, child sexual abuse material (CSAM), being lured by online predators, and changing sexual arousal templates in kids brains (kids are not designed to have these templates created so early). \*\*References are available on the school counseling website.

### WHAT CAN YOU DO?


- Conversation is key: Talking to kids about online safety
  with age appropriate and open communication is the
  most effective, more than a restrictive approach (rules,
  limits, boundaries, controls); however, there is a place for
  this too.
- Learn more: Buy books to help enhance these conversations (not just a one time sex talk).



- Infuse your values and beliefs into these conversations and try to avoid shaming kids about their developing sexuality.
- Digitize your parenting skills: Teach your children harms and risks and how to stay safe from viewing porn or other harmful content. Consider adding filters.
- Increase digital supervision: Set limits on screen time, create contracts for smartphones, have boundaries for where devices are in your home, shut off internet access at night and be interested and curious to learn from kids about what they are doing online.
- Engage in conversations with other parents; talk about it, share notes!
- Sign the petition for age verification to access porn. (go to defenddignity.ca)

It is important to take the time to acknowledge this silent crisis and move toward preventing harm and supporting our children. As Christians, we can deeply appreciate the need to be discerning about the harmful messages that are bombarding kids in their digital world. We can also appreciate that there are benefits within the online world. So acknowledging the benefits and harms, and the importance of educating kids about how to safely use their smartphones and devices is just as important as taking drivers education before driving a car.
















### **Bookmarks for Peace**

THIS IS A STORY of what happened one ordinary morning in grade 3B, shortly before our March break when the students learned that Russia had invaded Ukraine, and that one of our classmates had family members living there. We instantly felt that we wanted to show our support to our classmate and her family, and soon a project came together that we called "Bookmarks for Peace." It was decided that each student would try to colour and sell 4 bookmarks, with a class goal of raising \$100, which we would then send to World Renew. I vividly recall saying to the students during that Morning Meeting, "Let's see how God will bless this," as we spent some time in prayer. Our adventure of colouring bookmarks had begun.

We made a thermometer to hang in the hallway to show the amount of money that had been collected. Our goal seemed lofty but reachable, and that it was. \$100 was collected within just a few short days! 

Mary Ann Shadd Cary was an inspiring black Canadian who fought for what she believed. She was born on October 9, 1823, in Wilmington, Delaware. Mary was the first Black woman to publish a newspaper in North Ámerica. The Provincial Freeman was published on March 24, 1853. She became a teacher for Black children in Windsor. Soon after, Mary started writing educational pamphlets promoting settlement in Canada, including a Plea for Emigration, or Notes of Canada West which was written in 1852. The whole Shadd family were activists for numerous causes such as the abolition of slavery, temperance (the stop of alcoholic drinks) and education. She was very vocal about women's rights and she talked about these issues in The Provincial Freeman and on lecture tours. Following being in Canada, Mary decided to return to the United States as a recruitment agent for the Union Army during the Civil War. Then, she got a law degree at Howard University and became one of the first Black women to complete a law degree. In 1883, Mary became a civil rights lawyer. Later on, she became the first Black woman to vote in a national election. In 1994, she was assigned a Person of National Historic Significance in Canada. Mary shows us that we should fight for what we believe is wrong because we can do anything we put our mind to. - Rose G.

Have you ever wondered why people learn about history? One reason is that it's a way to be inspired by what other people have accomplished, like Portia White. Portia was born on June 24,1911 in Truro, Nova Scotia. She first started singing at her father's Baptist church in Halifax. She then started teaching in black schools in Halifax while starting to build her singing career. Portia performed professionally for the first time in Toronto and then went to perform in New York to get more reviews. She did concerts all across Canada, the U.S., and central and south America. In 1964 she performed a special concert at the Charlottetown Confederation Center for the Queen. She became a national success as a concert singer, overall doing more than 100 concerts! Portia inspires me to follow my dreams, and I hope she has the same effect on others that she had on me. - Ava P.

Learning about and knowing the history of the world around you is important. Knowing the history of your country and some people who had an impact in the country could inspire you. Here in Canada, there are many strong black women but, Violet King Henry had a quite significant impact in my opinion, so let us talk a little more about her. Violet's parents, John and Stella King, moved to Calgary in 1919 where she was born on October 18, 1929, but she died in Chicago on March 30, 1982. She and her brother were both of African-American descent. She had a daughter named Jo-Anne Henry, and her husband's name was Godfrey Henry. Violet went to Crescent Heights High School, where she found her passion for the law and decided she wanted to be a criminal lawyer. We know from one of Violet's more popular quotes that not many people thought it was a good idea for her to become a lawyer. The quote states, " People told me it was not a good idea for a girl to be a lawyer, particularly a coloured girl, so I went ahead." She did not let those people stop her. She went to the University of Alberta and paid for the expenses by teaching piano lessons. Violet was one of only three women studying law there. She received the Executive "A" Gold Ring award for her many contributions to her university along with four others and graduated with a law degree and a bachelor of arts degree in 1952. She was the first black person to graduate from a law school in Alberta, and the only graduating woman in her class. - Chichi U.

Someone who inspired me and hopefully can inspire you is Dr. Alexandra Bastiany. She was born and raised in Montreal and is fluent in French, English, and Haitian Creole. She works at the Thunder Bay Regional Health Centre as a Cardiologist. She has done so much to help her community. Dr. Bastiany has a medical degree and completed her Internal Medicine and Cardiology training at the Université de Montréal (UdeM). She graduated with honours as the UdeM Faculty Medicine's first black valedictorian. She followed her passion and partnered with La Maison d'Haiti, a local community center. Together, they organized learning sessions on common health problems concerning the Haitian People in Montreal, and for her work, she won 2nd place at the FMRQ Excelsior awards. She also worked with more organizations and began career days for minorities and children in need. For all her efforts, she became a role model to others who are reluctant to follow their passion. She has achieved so much in her life, and I think that we can learn from her and from her efforts to help her community. - Rachel W.






### **Grade 1B Animal Projects**

Grade One students explored the many ways God created animals in Ontario to survive in the different seasons.
