WHILE DRIVING HOME FROM SCHOOL earlier this year, I was listening to the radio and heard an advertisement pertaining to students attending public educational institutions returning back to school. The ad referenced how our publicly funded institutions would be prepared to welcome students back to a full school experience, which included in person learning, extracurricular activities, and a focus on math, science and technology. A special emphasis was on preparing students for the workforce. The curricular focus is what caught my attention. While I agree with the importance of teaching the skills associated with math, tech, and science, I was puzzled by the lack of focus on teaching discernment, decision making, and collaboration. Whereas I value our public school system and I really see the importance of it, I was disappointed that there was no mention of what is also truly needed in our education system. In this complex and polarized society, why was there no mention of teaching students the importance of discernment and getting along with others? I know the importance of math, tech and science, but what about the important lessons found in English, history, social studies and fine arts? There is no doubt in my mind that STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) learning can provide the important answers as they pertain to dealing with the physical realities of life, but I'm not sure they help us as much in dealing with poverty, discrimination, caring for our neighbours, and other social justice issues-issues that God commands us to address.

The church I attend runs a girls program called GEMS (Girls Everywhere Meeting the Saviour), which has Micah 6:8 as the theme verse. The passage–"do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with your God" speaks very specifically to the importance of addressing some of the more pressing issues in our society, especially as it relates to loving our neighbours. I believe that Christian education, and Calvin Christian School in particular, strives to instill the need to love our neighbours, and the units and lessons we teach are tailored to doing that. Each morning teachers begin the day with scripture reading and devotions, with the intent of bringing purpose and direction to our day. We are blessed to be able to provide students with the rationale as to why we must address poverty, injustice, war, and other things that plague our world and communities.

I recently had the opportunity to engage in a couple of professional development opportunities. The first event I attended was the Christian Schools Canada Leadership Conference held in Winnipeg. The theme of the conference was "At the Table". Four broad topics were covered:

- The table is a place of **Blessing**: together we give thanks to God and are eager for God's word of blessing and direction.
- The table is a place of **Brokenness**: family tables are often messy, with impassioned (and sometimes) heated discussion, where people share the hard things in life.
- The table is a place of **Connection**: we slow down, we listen, we share stories, we laugh and cry, and we are nourished.
- The table is a place of **Giving**: where we encourage, nurture and equip each other for life away from the table, where we embody in the world the love we experienced around the Table.

From the conversations at this conference, I was reassured that the work we do at CCS is Kingdom work, work that God has called us to do. The education at CCS is so much more than preparing students for a well paying job. We are called to sit around a table and address the messiness of life, and that messiness takes part in a caring community setting, where we seek to reflect God's love to those around us. Part of that calling includes relying on God's Holy Spirit, rather than on our own abilities.

At the conference we also had the privilege to listen to Danielle Strickland, who was one of the keynote speakers. Ms. Strickland referenced the concept of power and how God's power is different from our earthly concepts of power. The following points stood out for me:

- Access to God's power is found in intimacy with Jesus. Jesus created connections with people often inviting them to eat with him "at the table".
- God's power is unlimited.
- If we operate out of fear, we will be oppressed or we will be the oppressor.
- The power God gives to us allows us to lay down our lives for others.
- Power should be other-centered, not self-centered.

You can see that if we operate with even some of the above understanding of power, we will make this world a better place to live. This understanding of power is not related to well paying jobs and successful careers, although those things may be important. Rather, it is other focused, using our influence or power for the betterment of others, knowing that our true power lies in the strength of our local and global communities. At CCS, we call this "equipping to shine".

The second conference I attended was the Edvance Annual Gathering held at the end of October at Redeemer University. The theme of this conference was "Flourishing Together" and included the broad themes of a shared purpose in our Christian schools where we "work toward a greater good to which we aspire together," and doing this work in authentic relationships, or in relationships that allow us to thrive and flourish, as was articulated by the keynote speakers. At CCS, there has been a concerted effort to be more intentional when it comes to authentic relationships and community building. Our Racial Diversity and Belonging Committee specifically reflects upon ways in which we can flourish together as a school community, and our teachers create lessons and opportunities for students to be mindful of the importance of belonging. These efforts are done with an eye towards thriving and flourishing relationships in our broader community, which seem more important than ever in our polarized society.

There were lots of additional great learning opportunities at the two conferences, as our calling as educators is so much more than equipping students to acquire skills to get a good job or to make a lot of money. The work carried out in Christian schools is designed to make the world a better place to live, a place that reflects God's norms for living in community. Please pray for the mission of Calvin Christian School as we seek to equip our students to shine, to shine not for their own glory, but for the Glory of our Creator and God.

The Campaign has begun!

BUILDING UNITY has gone from a concept to a reality in 2022, thanks to the wonderful blessing from God that has been visible through the generosity of so many people in the CCS community. As we work towards the goal of raising 5 million dollars in support of this project, all of us involved want to take a moment to say a heartfelt thank you to those who have already given of their time, abilities, and financial resources to the Building Unity Campaign.

Building Unity began as the answer to a challenge that CCS was facing. For seventy years God has blessed the school on West 5th as generations of children were educated there. We hope all of you who follow CCS on social media such as Instagram and Facebook have been enjoying the "Throwback Thursday" posts, weekly reminders of that history and those blessings (and fun glimpses at the kind of clothing, eyeglasses and hairstyles people use to wear!) The ongoing celebrations this year are a wonderful reminder of all that has happened on West 5th since Calvin Christian School's foundation in 1952.

So what is the challenge? Calvin Christian School at West 5th has reached its maximum capacity and families are being turned away. At a time when there is growing demand for Christian elementary school education in the Greater Hamilton and Caledonia area, there is no room for more children at West 5th. The city of Hamilton and surrounding towns like Caledonia are expanding, with many new houses being built, meaning there are more children to educate. Recent research tells us that more people are seeking alternatives for their children because, for various reasons, they are dissatisfied with the public options. Those factors add up to more families in this area looking for Christian education for their children. Calvin Christian School's vision is that all God's children are thoroughly equipped for every good work (2 Timothy 3:17). Calvin Christian School must rise to this challenge, and it has.

The Building Unity Capital Campaign is raising 5 million dollars towards the goal of a complete JK to Grade 8 school building on a second campus. Property has been acquired and plans have been drawn up so that CCS Unity can educate some 180 students from JK to Grade 8, in parallel to CCS West 5th. With expansion at Unity, CCS can meet the needs of the coming generation of students in both its locations. There will be room on both campuses for more children to be equipped to shine. Building Unity's goal of \$5 million towards the cost of construction at Unity, the largest Campaign in CCS's 70year history, has been prayerfully considered and carefully planned by members of this community. A wonderful day of celebration in May marked the public launch, which rejoiced in the blessings already received from several major underwriting donors, who have given generously. Under the guidance of the Board and of Principal Arn Boonstra, two staff members and a team of volunteers have been raising funds by means of visits, phone calls, social media, and a mail appeal. The Campaign has been blessed with almost 1.5 million dollars to date and we look forward to further support from the CCS Community in the coming year.

As you know, the school at Unity has already begun. The property on Unity Road contained a small school building which created more capacity to accept students into CCS at both the West 5th and Unity campuses. In the fall of 2022, there are 459 students being educated at West 5th campus, in JK to Grade 8, while 55 students are enrolled at the Unity campus, in JK to Grade 3 -- combined, well over 500 students are receiving a Christian education at CCS! You've been reading great stories of all that God is doing at Unity campus through a dedicated staff who have begun this work, and there is more to read elsewhere in this issue of inTouch. When the building, projected to begin in 2025, is complete, CCS will have two campuses offering full JK to Grade 8 programs to meet the challenge of providing Christian education for all who are knocking at our doors.

\$1,000,000 Worth of Donation from the re-Source Thrift Shop

I REMEMBER BACK in 2012, the CCS board was introduced to the fundraising concepts associated with thrift shops. I remember, then chairperson, Marcel deRegt, telling us about the success of thrift shops as they supported Christian schools across North America. He referenced what thrift shops could do and how they could be a blessing to Christian schools. I remember when he stated that there was a thrift shop that was actually contributing \$70,000 to a local Christian school. I kind of chuckled to myself and said, sure, but I bet everything goes exactly according to a plan that was laid out.

The CCS board at that time made the important decision to give it a try, recognizing that we would require the support of the local CCS community and beyond. In April of 2013, the re-Source Thrift Shop was opened on Greenhill Avenue in Stoney Creek. The early humble beginnings saw a lot of work and little pay back. From the very beginning there was a drive and desire to make things work, but the business model just didn't seem to work, at least not yet. Virtually everything, including shelving and a cash register, were donated to get the venture off the ground. Thankfully a private lender in the CCS community loaned the shop the first and last month's rent. Very modest income came in and a few thousand dollars were donated to CCS. Visions of \$70,000 were far off.

The shop laboured through its first few years of operations, but the commitment of the volunteers never wavered. However, in the year of 2015, the shop came to a crossroad. Either a new location be considered, or the shop might have to shut down. It was clear that the location of the thrift shop in Stoney Creek was far from ideal. It was around that time that the thrift shop board pitched a new location -1050 Upper Gage Road on the Hamilton Mountain. It was decided that the move would be in the best interest of the shop and eventually the move was made.

It was soon after this move that the shop began to take off. With far greater visibility and the continued dedication of the volunteers, sales began to increase. It wasn't long before \$70,000, and more, was being donated to CCS annually. The shop began to thrive so much that they found themselves in the position where they could tithe a portion of proceeds to local charities, in order to give back to the greater Hamilton community.



With its overall mission of supporting Christian education as a central focus, the re-Source Thrift Shop has blossomed into a thriving enterprise that is now donating over \$300,000 a year to CCS, well beyond the \$70,000 mark. I'm still chuckling about the donations, but now the laughter is one of joy and thankfulness. Just this past winter, the shop exceeded the \$1,000,000 mark in overall donations. This amazing support has allowed CCS to better carry out its mission of equipping our students to shine. The financial support has allowed us to fund capital projects that would normally result in additional costs to parents or increased tuition. Over the years funds donated to CCS have allowed us to purchase hundreds of chromebooks for our students, replace roof top units on our building, and repave significant sections of our parking lot - all big capital expenses.

Thank you re-Source Thrift Shop for the amazing support you have been to Calvin Christian School, but more importantly, thank you to the dedicated volunteers who are really the heart and soul of the re-Source thrift shop organization. We are tremendously blessed by your generosity.

CALVIN CHRISTIAN SCHOOL includes music education at every stage of learning, beginning with singing and rhythm instruments in kindergarten and grade one. In grades two and three, students participate in "2-3 Sing," where they meet weekly to learn and practice new songs, and they are introduced to music theory with their classroom teachers. Instrumental music instruction starts in grade four. With recorders in grades four and five, students have the opportunity to learn about music with an instrument that is accessible and easily managed at their young age. From there, students move on to the ukulele in grade six, where they are able to further develop their skills by focusing on rhythm, chord progressions, and more. By the time students enter grades seven and eight, they are able to choose their own instrument in their band classes. Here they learn more complex theoretical concepts and various techniques required for different instruments, including embouchures, fingerings, and clef-reading.

Ensembles at any age develop a child's aural, team building, problem solving, and critical thinking skills, which immediately transfer into their other coursework. CCS offers many extra-curricular ensembles, including Senior Choir, Concert Band and Praise Team. The school also offers private piano and vocal lessons for students who just can't get enough of music!















THE STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES TEAM at Calvin Christian School West 5th campus is very excited to share information about the new Assisted Therapy Dog program. We feel that this service will be an important and beneficial addition to the support of all students but especially students with social, emotional, behavioural, or neurodiverse needs.

Assisted Therapy Dogs are not service dogs. An Assisted Therapy Dog is an interactive dog trained to work for a handler to provide service and comfort to many people. Assisted Therapy Dogs join their handler/owner (typically educators, teachers, psychologists, counsellors, or doctors) at their workplace to help students, clients, customers, or patients. Service dogs are trained to perform tasks to ease an individual handlers' neurodiverse needs, helping them to attain safety and independence.

Research shows that therapy dogs can promote a positive school environment, improve psychological wellbeing in students, and reduce stress (VonLintel, J. and Bruneau, L.).



Interacting with animals naturally produces an increase in oxytocin, dopamine, and serotonin levels, which are linked to a positive emotional state. Petting a dog has the effect of lowering blood pressure, heart rate, and stress hormones, like cortisol. As most dog owners know, dogs are great companions and are good listeners who make no judgments. When a child has an opportunity to bond with a dog it can help them feel more connected and confident, which could also lead to a reduction in negative behavior and aggression. Just by having a dog in the building, to interact with staff and students, can improve the overall emotional climate and foster positive relationships.

Sydnie is a Certified Assisted Therapy Dog with Companion Paws and she has 3 years experience working at an elementary school. Sydnie will begin her work in January 2023. She has undergone training, annual health requirements, and is certified every year to maintain Assisted Therapy Dog status. To succeed as a Companion Paws Assisted Therapy Dog, along with the above, the dog must be well trained, friendly, gentle, calm, loving and show absolutely no aggression towards adults, children and other dogs.

The program will be coordinated by the school counsellor Mrs. Schinkel, Mrs. Kikkert from Student Support Services, and Mr. Stam, the Gr 6 teacher, owner, experienced program facilitator. Additionally, the dog therapy team consists of the following Educational Assistants: Mrs. Knevel, Mrs. Parr, and Mrs. Verhoeven. All of these individuals have completed their handler certification with the Companion Paws Assisted Therapy Dog program, through the LifeLine Canada Foundation. The team has been working diligently on their handler training and familiarizing Sydnie with the school environment.

Sydnie will be housed during the day in the Student Support Services area, either in a crate or with the handler, to monitor the program and maintain consistency. Sydnie will only be accessible for student support with the supervision of a trained handler. The Assisted Dog therapy team, in conjunction with staff, will make recommendations regarding how and for whom the dog may provide support for any given situation. Children at CCS may have the opportunity to participate in the program by interacting with Sydnie in a controlled setting supervised by one of our Certified Handlers. This could happen in a number of different ways over the school year:

- Greeting students in the hallway
- · Visits to classrooms or reading groups
- Sitting with students in the Student Support Services area or in the School Counselling office to reset when feeling overwhelmed
- Helping ease tension with a small group working on resolving conflict
- Providing a calming influence during stressful situations e.g. immunizations

Students will have an opportunity to learn about the program and be introduced to Sydnie in a whole student body assembly in January 2023, where students will learn how they can interact appropriately with Sydnie and how to follow consistent rules of conduct.

Every year, the Building Committee undertakes different projects for both the West 5th Campus and the Unity Campus with a desire to improve the services we strive to offer, as well as enhance student enjoyment while in attendance. This past summer the Building Committee focused on two significant items.

The most visible change is experienced as soon as you drive onto the West 5th campus. You will notice the new asphalt on the front parking lot as well as inside the compound (both south and north sides of the building). This project has been in the works for several years, but with the impact of Covid, it was decided that the resources we had at the time were best used to navigate the changes needed in order for us to continue with in person learning. With this delay well navigated, we were ready to commit to the project. The final part of this enhanced space happened in the middle of November when we were able to paint several spaces for asphalt games to be played. This area, so capably designed by several of our EAs, has been well received by students and staff alike.

A second project that is currently underway is to enhance, and create new space for the Student Support Services. New flooring has been installed, and a new room created which allows for various professional services to have access to a dedicated space when they work with our students. This was also topped off with a fresh coat of paint to brighten the overall look of this beautiful space.

Finally, if you have been in attendance at one of the chapels, parent teacher conferences, or the bazaar, you may have noticed the new gymnasium floor. Back in January of 2022 the fire suppression system experienced a malfunction, leading to a flood throughout the gym.

Several tiles were damaged, and in a state of disrepair.

In seeking best steps to repair the existing tiles, we discovered that the tiled gym floor had already outlived its expected lifespan by several years. Our school insurance company indicated that the damage caused by the malfunction made us eligible to submit a claim. Through our work with the insurance company, we were approved to install the current floor and lines. We set a late summer date for replacement.
